WHAT HOMESCHOOLING IS:



BE IN GOOD STANDING



Research Your State's Regulations: Understand the homeschooling laws and requirements in your state, as they vary. Some states may require notification or assessments while others do not. DEFINE YOUR APPROACH

ASSESS THEIR PROGRESS

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STAY LEGAL AND DOCUMENT
